

WPI students teach kindergartners how to graph

What do M&Ms, circles and squares, and Gummy Bears have to do with math? For the 24 five-year-olds in Dot Shea's kindergarten class at City View Magnet School in Worcester, these familiar objects helped them understand the principles of graphing, data collecting and statistical analysis. Led by a team of four Worcester Polytechnic Institute juniors, the children, who worked in groups of six, were able to predict how many objects of a certain color were in a set, sorted each set by color or shape, put the objects on a graph, and discussed how close their estimations came to the actual quantities.

Bruce W. Army, Eric A. Keener, David M. Perri, and Rick W. Porter, prepared and presented five lessons based on the guidelines and standards of the National Council of Teacher of Mathematics (NCTM), which suggest that young children be introduced to math through the use of items they recognize, and thus become comfort-

able with math and see its many uses. Shea's class, like others at City View, is comprised of students from virtually all of the city's economic, social, ethnic and racial backgrounds. Shea taught follow-up lessons after the WPI students completed their project.

The students completed their research to satisfy their Interactive Qualifying Project (IQP) requirement. Dahlin Tang, assistant professor of mathematics, was the project advisor.

Francis J. Trainor, head of WPI's School College Collaboration in Mathematics and Science Education, says this IQP is one example of the kinds of projects the Institute is involved in under the collaboration, which was created in 1988 to strengthen ties with local school systems and to work closely with them in meeting the challenges of creating a restructured, relevant curriculum. By doing so, WPI acknowledges that education is a continuing process from kindergarten to college, and that linkage between vari-

ous educational levels is essential.

"One of our lessons involved building blocks," says Perri. "We showed the children photographs of buildings and had them duplicate the shapes with the blocks, then place the blocks on the graph paper to construct a real graph. We asked them to make distinctions between specific columns, to see the most popular shape, and how many more of one shape there was than of another. They had little trouble with the concepts."

"This was a very positive experience for my students," says Shea. "It's wonderful that college students are getting interested in the elementary schools. They were very enthusiastic and patient with the children and served as excellent role models. Most kindergarten children know how to count to 10 but they do not have a concept of what 10 means. The WPI students helped the children move from rote counting to number concepts." Shea says she tested the children some-

time after the lessons ended to determine if they retained the graphing concepts they learned. "Seventy-five

percent of the children were successful," she says.



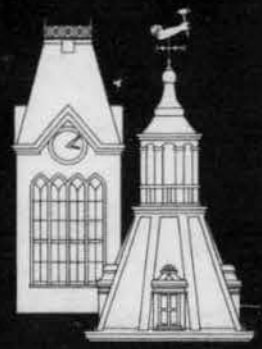

If you didn't go see New Voices, it is hard to recap every play for you here, but to give credit where credit is due, some of my favorites were: Run Rabbit Run, by Kyle Outlaw; Hats, by Duane Morin and Rob Douglas; Cloud Chamber, by Charles Lyons; A Form of Love Story, by Timothy McInerney; Sabel, by Kelli Clark; and Quintus Pryde II, by Robert H. Tarr.

Adding to the excitement was Some Assembly Required, WPI's own improvisational theater group. These guys were whacked. You could never tell what they were going to do from one minute to the next, which was obviously their main attraction. Since most of their show was based on audience participation, they didn't even know what they would end up doing. By stringing together different situations suggested by the audience, or by having conversations where the audi-

ence could fill in key words, the whole experience felt like one big Mad Lib. It was great fun and a welcomed change of pace between plays.

The acting in New Voices X was impressive considering how much work the actors had between rehearsal and their normal course load. Sometimes, however, I felt that the actors were just reciting the script with some inflections here and there, instead of actually performing it. But taking into consideration that WPI is an engineering school and not a school for the performing arts, everyone should be commended for a job well done. Bravo! A handful of the actors were very talented, however, being less "rigid" and much more believable than the others. They made you feel like you were watching real life, instead of a student play. A few of my favorite actors and actresses from New Voices X were: Michael Bleyhl, Aedin Culhane, Jonathan Davis, Craig Johnson, Jim Moore, Kristin Sullivan, and Jim Tyrell. Look out for these people in the future.

The New Voices experience is an exciting and memorable one. It is one of the few campus activities that truly unites everybody with a common cause; to analyze the weirdness in life, or be entertained by it. If you missed New Voices this year, I would suggest never missing it again. If you did see it this year, pat the writers and actors that you know personally on the back. Let them know what a wonderful service they provided for their peers, and get them to do it again next year. Our campus is like an empty box. You only get out of it what you put in to it. Let's keep putting in great efforts like New Voices X!

WPI students honored by Spencer Institute

In a small ceremony on the WPI Campus, Dr. Jack Porter, Director of the Spencer Institute for Business and Society announced the winners of the Spencer Institute Essay competition on the C.P. Snow "Two Cultures" debate. The Winner of the \$50.00 first prize was WPI Freshman Thomas Russell, an interdisciplinary major. The two second prizes of \$25.00 each went to Ross Weyman and Thomas Purcell. Ross was at the London Project Center, but he was told he'd won before he left. Honorable Mention certificates went to Steven Backer, Joseph Carpentier, Brian Raymond, Benjamin Kibler and Anthony Gonzalez - all of WPI.

In his comments Porter said that he was impressed by the extent to which the competition was dominated by technologists who had given attention to the humanities and social sciences, largely due to the 18 WPI submissions. The contestants from liberal arts colleges were outnumbered 6:1 in the end and showed less feel for the technical culture than the technical people did for the humanistic fields. WPI's "technological humanists" swept all three prizes in the contest, largely because so many dared to tackle an issue many others were reluctant to

address.

Porter offered a challenge to his audience, vowing to run the contest again next year, possibly with a different (though related) topic. Next year he hoped more people would explore the potential pivotal role of the social sciences, and especially, sociology, in bridging the "two cultures." Someone from the audience suggested that it was not clear whether the social sciences were in a strategic position or caught in the crossfire, but that they had noticed elements of each in their first contact with sociology. Indeed, the 18 WPI students that moved in and dominated the Spencer student essay competition were all members of Professor John Wilkes' introductory sociology class, SS1202 in B term of this academic year. Most had heard of this classic debate for the first time in that class, and took advantage of Wilkes' offer to let their essays stand as term papers for the class.

Some members of the WPI Chapter of Student Pugwash urged that the next round of the contest involving WPI contributions not be limited to the members of a single class. In their view, the topic was a good one for independent studies and writing in other classes as well as a subject someone might want to tackle on their own without getting course credit if they knew about it well in advance.
