Piping Plovers have been federally listed as Threatened on the Endangered Species Act since 1986 and are currently listed as Threatened in Massachusetts.

Background Facts:

- Piping plover is a shoreline bird found on Massachusetts coastlines
- Their population began diminishing after WWII, when humans began to expand their population onto coastlines.
- Population graphs have been increasing in recent years due to conservation efforts
- Bringing domesticated animals on coastlines oftentimes causes plovers to abandon their nests
- Motorized Vehicles on coastlines is a major contributor to the high rates of piping plover chick death


