

Mental Health in Kenya

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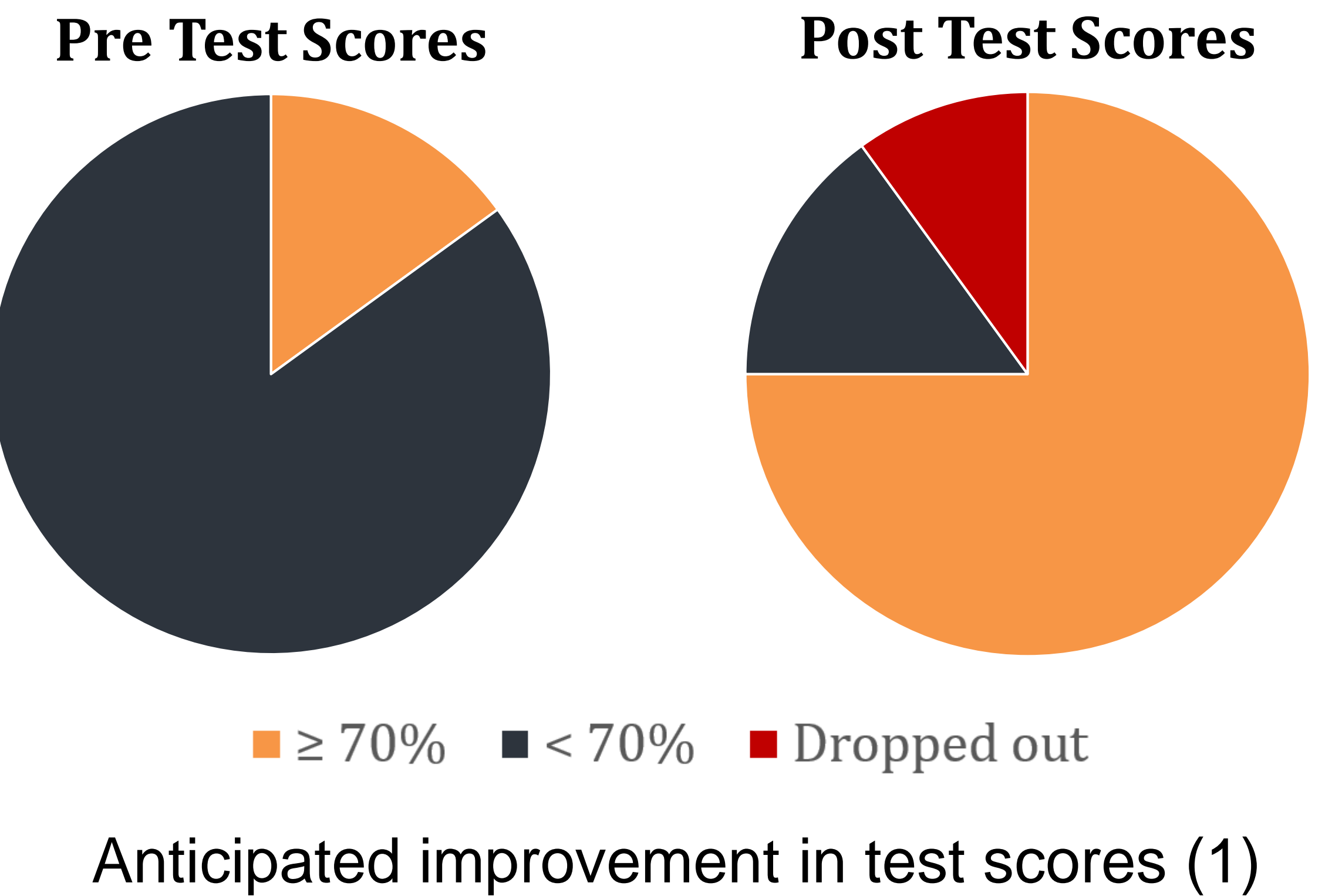
Abstract

Project Goals/Objectives

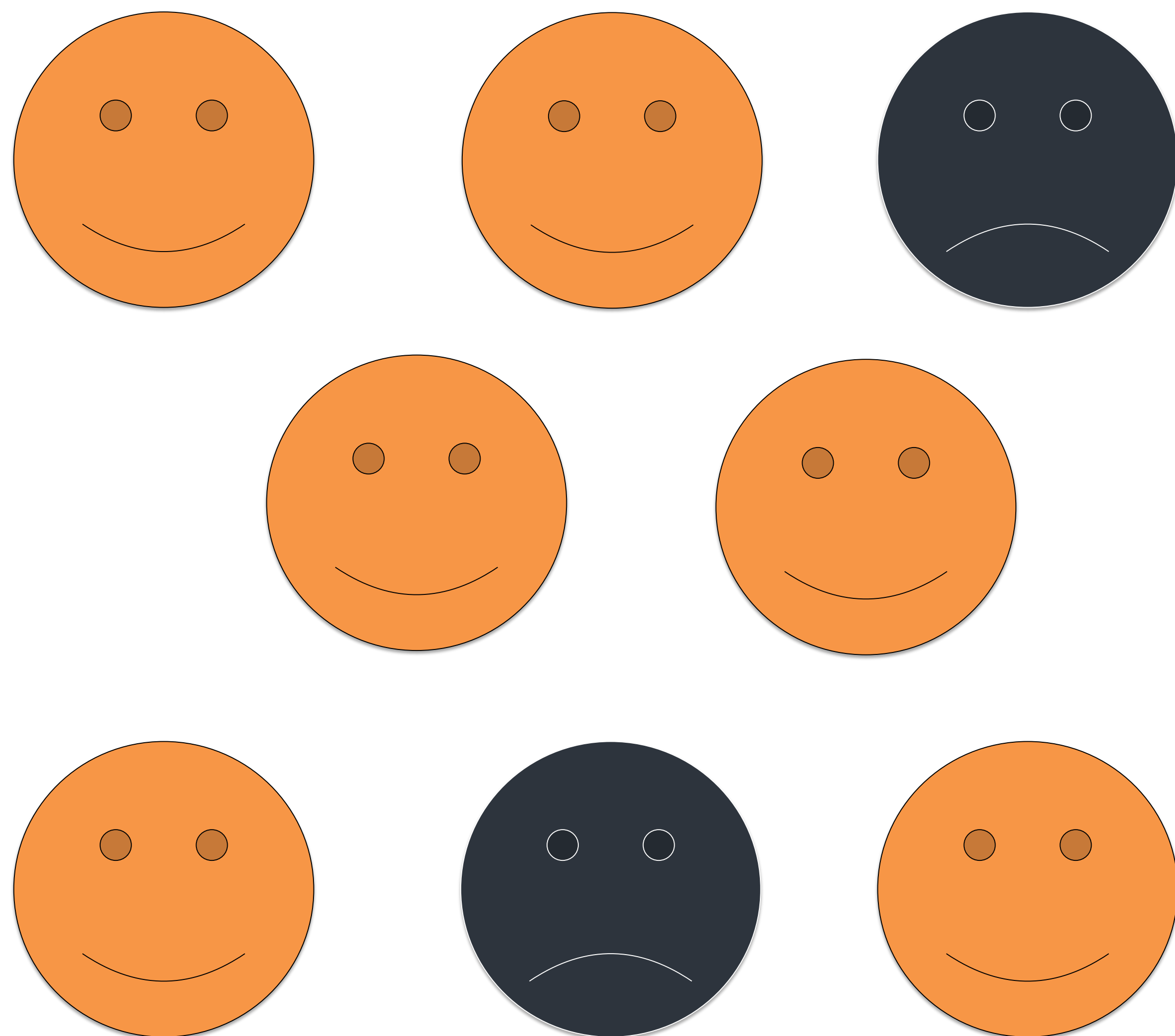
- To improve the treatment of people with mental illness

Anticipated Results



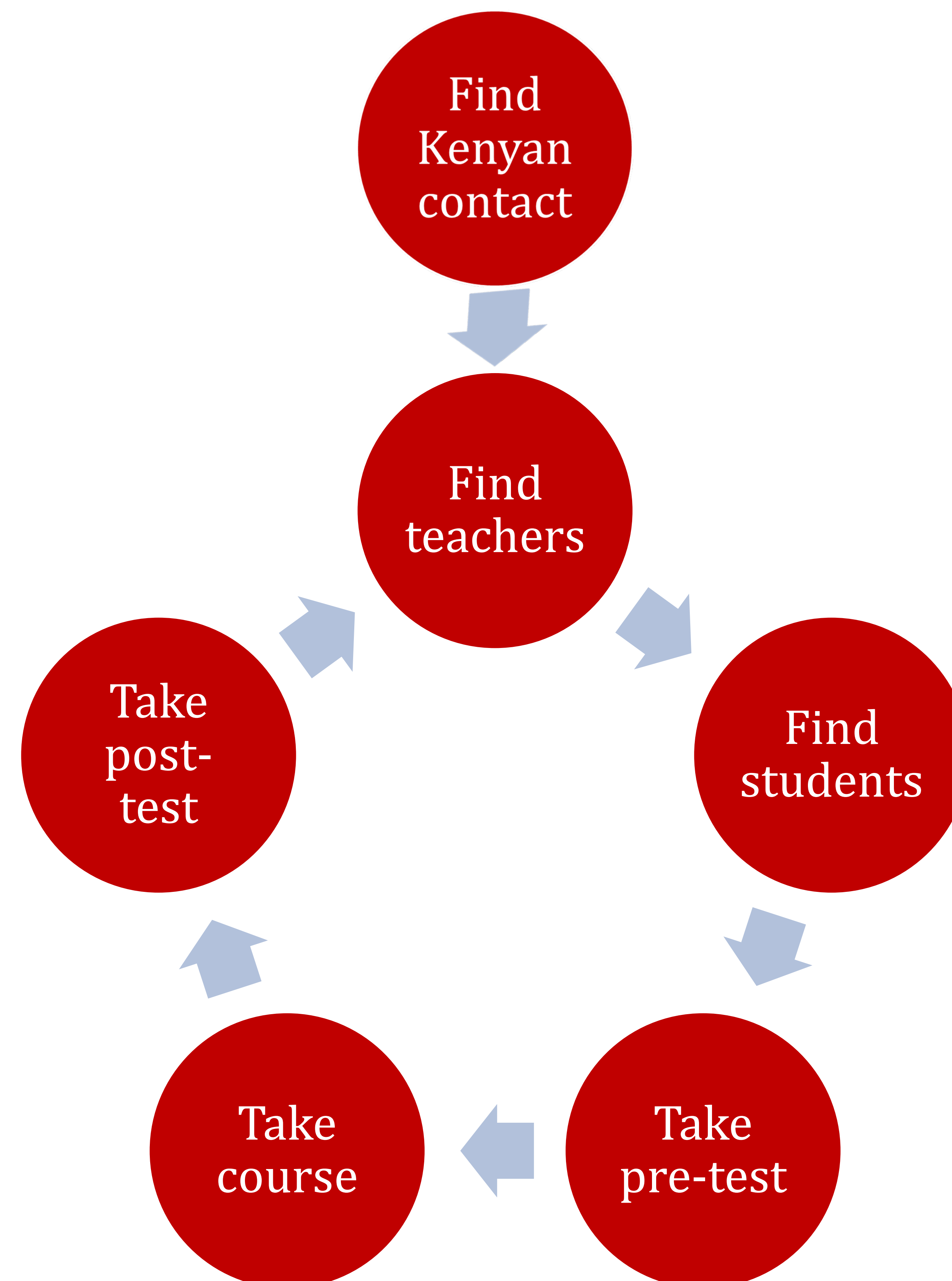
Background
