Appendix B: Interview Information Sheet for the Massachusetts Organization of African Descendants (MOAD)

Interview Information Sheet

Interview methodology

• The kind of interview we will be conducting is a semi-structured interview method. It's basically a meeting in which the interviewer asks open-ended questions, allowing for discussion with the interviewee rather than straightforward question and answer format. The interviewer can also ask probing questions if they feel like we need further information about something the interviewee mentioned.

Who are we interviewing?

• A representative of the Massachusetts Organization of African Descendants (MOAD).

How will the interview be conducted?

- Interviews can be done in one of two ways:
 - Over a Zoom conference call and recorded with the interviewee's permission.
 - Conventional phone call.

What information will be collected?

- Information about the sponsoring organization and the project motivation.
- The severity of the food insecurity crisis within the African community.
 - The causes and prevalence of food insecurity in the African community.
- Location of food insecure families in Worcester.
- Platforms the organization uses to talk to members of the African community, potentially people who will use the service.
 - Best way our team can get in touch with the African Community.
- More information on the Mobile Food Van.
 - Where is the food coming from; receiving donations, catering from food restaurants or purchasing certain foods weekly; operation on a first come first serve basis or the families have to sign up to receive food.
 - Selection process: client chosen or pre-boxed food.
 - Quantity of food weekly/monthly needed.
